Best Practices

Annexure 2 – (i)

Title: Bridging the gap between doctor and patient – Way for effective communication.

Objectives:

- To set up counseling training for resident doctors.
- To formulate program of one to one counseling for newly admitted patients in clinical departments.
- To develop protocol for taking informed consent, risk consent and likely problems thereof.

Context:

Present day hospital setting are increasingly experiencing altercations between inpatients, their relatives, attending doctors and a lot of mistrust.

Doctors lack in counseling practices and in available time for communicating with the patients in daily practice. Presently patients and relatives has lot of mistrust for the treating doctors and hospital staff. They have lost faith for the treating doctors and their management skill. Some times there is an added factor about possible exploitation and amount of incurred expenses. As far as medical faculty is concern they too lack in creating openness in communication, available options, cost thereof likely outcome and complications. Emphasis is needed on taking informed consent after ensuring that the patient, his family understand what has been told about their illness. Further it is important to be a good listener and be patient in communication with patients and their families.

Practices:

- Counseling, training approximately for 2 days to all senior residents in clinical departments.
- Allocation of newly admitted patients to respective unit residents.
- Documentation of all the sessions.
- Supervision and discussion of individual case, lessons learnt thereof.
- Written protocols for informed consent and risk consent.
- To organize communication skill workshop.

Evidence of success:

- Feedback from patients and nursing staff.
- Feedback from relatives of patients individually.
- Open communication between patients his/her relatives with the hospital staff on duty.

Problems encountered:

- Continuity to be maintained despite busy and over burdened wards.
- Repeat trainings for counseling for required which is difficult because of lack of available time.

Resources required:

- For counseling, training sessions for the clinical staff.
- Arranging workshops on communication skill for doctors, nurses and other hospital staff.

Annexure 2 – (ii)

Title: Strengthening breast feeding and neonatal care services - Enhancing maternal efforts.

Objectives:

- To boost the knowledge and practices of breast feeding and neonatal care in maternity wards by team of Doctors and Nurses.
- To educate the mother and her family regarding do's and don't's.
- To set up prenatal counseling clinic in antenatal clinic. Including Garbh Sanskar Shibir.
- To arrange group discussions pregnant mothers and their families regarding best practices in breast feeding and neonatal care with emphasis on mysths and realities.

Context:

Breast feeding is the best feeding is well-known and accepted norm. However, difficulties faced by primi gravida are many. Patient listening and demo will go a long way in overcoming them. The problems faced by rural and urban population are to be considered separately. In urban setup women are stressed out because of tide work scheduled, employment, lack of space and less cooperation from busy family member etc. in rural set up they are sure about the need and benefits but lot of misconceptions, traditional beliefs and age old consepts and practices which may be some times dangerous. Further they lack in proper weaning practices and other neonatal and infant feeding programs, availability and likely cost. Proper neonatal and infant care need to be taught and followed up.

Practices:

- Training of female residents and nursing students for educating the mother for correct techniques to be followed and to anticipate and identify the problems thereof.
- SOP's prepared and given to each one recently delivered in the ward about proper neonatal care. Special emphasis is put on various myths and harmful practices carried out in the home.
- Educational material to be prepared and distributed.
- Audiovisual presentations, short films, videos to be prepared and projected in maternity wards and antenatal clinics.
- Special focus on group discussion for delivered women and their families for good neonatal care practices.

Evidence of success:

- Good response for Antenatal clinic, Educational and motivational program with emphasis on good maternal nutrition.
- Happy mother and happy baby.
- Least number of complications.
- Utilization of breast support group for effective baby friendly hospital.

Problems encountered:

- Constraint of adequate space and time in crowded maternity wards.
- Lack of privacy.
- Lots of misconceptions and myths in women and their families.

Resources required:

- Trend nursing and medical staff training programs arrangement in ANC and PNC ward.
- Provision of Audiovisual aids and facilities.
- Arrangement for some nutritional supplements as encouragement and incentives.
